Conservation Committee report for newsletter, Feb, 2024

During 2023, The Conservation Committee's focus was working on a report for Solano County Water Agency. The report was completed and submitted to SCWA in December, 2023. The report concerned habitat restoration and enhancement in lower Putah Creek and fishery management in the "interdam reach" downstream of Lake Berryessa. The Committee's Putah Creek team includes several retired biologists and aquatic habitat professionals. In January, 2024 the Committee met and reviewed organizations and conservation efforts that CFFU donates to and supports. The Committee made recommendations to the CFFU Board of Directors for continued support for these efforts. Also, the Committee continues to research other conservation needs and efforts that we can support with donations and/or volunteer effort. We are following current issues on the American and Yuba Rivers.

Tech Services Corner Jeff Morin

This month's Tech Services presentation, attended by sixteen CFFU club members, was timed just right to coincide with spring bass fly fishing. Kaz Wisniewski, owner/operator of Emerald Water Guide Services out of Trinity County traveled down to our humble piece of the state to share what he calls northern CA's best kept secret, fly fishing on Trinity Lake. Kaz began with an introduction to the history of the region and of Trinity Lake, which is the third largest reservoir in the state and once held the record for the largest smallmouth bass (SMB) caught in the state in 1976 at 9 lbs. Trinity Lake is home to SMB, largemouth bass (LMB), rainbow trout, kokanee and inland chinook.

Spring time is prime time for SMB with additional opportunities to hook trout found in the water inlets to the lake; just drop a rubber leg trout fly from your float 'n fly and who knows what you can come up with. Top water is also great from late spring to early fall and summer is the time for LMB and a great opportunity to throw some larger streams. Early fall the bass move shallow in the lake in an attempt to fatten up for the winter and by the time late fall comes around the bass have moved deeper. Don't forget about the seasonal (3rd week of June – 3rd week of July) Hexagenio Limbata hatch on the lake; the second largest mayfly hatch in the US on the northshore.


Kaz has a saying about the SMB in Trinity Lake, they are "tall smalls"; they have big shoulders. To read more, see the *Tech Services Corner*.


April 6, 2024 Save the Date! Annual Dinner and Fundraiser April 6th

Fly tiers exchange by Don Wallace

- Tim Au Young tied a Gold Ribbed Hare's Ear Nymph on a Masu size 10 hook using red flat waxed nylon. The tail is mink. The rib is metallic French ribbing. The abdomen and throax are Wapsi Awesome Possum. The wingcase is turkey tail. The head is a brass bead.
- 2. Rob Scafe tied a Milton Midge on a TMC 2457 size 14-18 hook using 8/0 or 70 denier black thread. The rib is small red wire. The thorax is peacock herl. The head is a 2.4 mm tungsten bead. Special items are: UV resin, "Loon Clear Fly Finish, Thin," or equivalent. For basic tying instructions check out the following website: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=s8g3yGg8Xhu
- 3. Bob Bettati tied an Orange Comet on a size 8 Tiemco 7999 hook using orange 6/0 thread. The eyes are bead chain. The tail is orange calf tail. The body is silver tinsel. The wing is orange hackle.
- **4.** Paul Smith tied an Elk Hair Caddis on a 12 TMC 5262 dry fly hook, using 6/0 dark brown thread. The rib is fine copper wire and the body is light brown dubbing. The wing is elk hair. The hackle is brown.
- 5. Diane Terrell tied a Zebra Midge on a size 10, 16, 18 hook using black, orange or brown thread. The rib is small fine wire in black, silver or gold. The head is a small glass beads or small gold beads. Tie in the ribbing and use thread to create a tapered thorax, wrap the ribbing to behind the bead.

DEMO TYER

The **Demo Tyer** was **Jeff Howard.** He tied a **Hot Butt Caddis** on a size 10 Daiichi 4640 jig hook, using hot orange or fluorescent orange thread. The bead head is a slotted tungsten fluorescent orange size 1/8 inch bead. The tail is 2 strands krystal flash, UV pearl. The rib is gold wire The body is hares ear dubbing or other. The hackle is Hungarian Partridge.

Special note: We could use the help of someone to photograph the fly submissions at the meeting that they may be shown in the next Newsletter.



BEGINNING FLY TYING RECAP By Tim Au Young

Hello membership, especially the 5 brave souls who registered for the CFFU Novice Fly Trying Class that began Feb. 12. 19, 26, 2024, all Mondays at the Northminister Presbyterian Church The following current members in good standing that participated were:

- 1. Paul S
- 2. Kevin R
- 3. David D
- 4. Sam M
- 5. Diane T

The schedule of events were:

- 1. Week 1 Going through the 15 page syllabus to acquaint everyone with terms and history for background information before tying. We basically went through equipment to include vises and what the differences were with the various manufacturers. After quickly going through all of this information we tied a Woolley Bugger. Although this streamer pattern is not what one would call the simplest pattern to begin starting new students, it did include 5 materials with beads and weight information. What took the longest time was explaining the various techniques, to include the 3 step "pinch wrap". HOMEWORK was assigned and the class ended in a whirl. HOMEWORK was explaining the Fly Tyers Exchange, just as we do at the monthly general meetings.
- 2. Week 2 After reviewing a self evaluation of what each student learned, did well, and what they could do differently, we proceeded to the week's patterns of the Pheasant Tail, and the Gold Ribbed Hare's Ear Nymphs to introduce dubbing. Again, HOMEWORK was assigned, and this week's patterns went from large #6 hooks, to smaller #10 hooks getting proportion in the minds of all students
- 3. Week 3 After again review with self evaluations and the Fly Tyers Exchange, we went in to dry fly patterns with the Elk Hair Caddis, and a demonstration of the Parachute Adams as time went too quickly for everyone to tie the mayfly imitation.

NOTES:

- 1. Students who did not bring their own fly tying vise/equipment were provided a very nice Peak non-rotary vise and full set of fly tying tools
- 2. CFFU provided all materials and step by step instructions to be added to their syllabus's to stay organized
- 3. The self evaluations and the HOMEWORK were instructional tools for each student

This particular introduction to fly tying was a great way for students to decide if fly tying, or, "the Angler's Art", is a hobby for them to start as a fly fishing participant. From an instructors standpoint, it was wonderful to see the great improvement in each tyer's ability to understand new concepts, and put them in to action.

Of course, this class would not have been possible without the Assistance of Michael/Christie Roberts, Forrest Oldham, Jeff Stephens/President, lone non CFFU member and long time student of Tim's from Kiene's Fly Shop, Tim C, who drove all the way from Lodi. Each of the Assistants oversaw almost on a one to one ratio the various knots, and techniques as we rolled through the class. THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU, ASSISTANTS!

One never forgets the first fish that they catch using a fly they tied! I am thrilled to hear the future stories as these spinners of fur and feathers define in their own way, what their legacy in fly tying will be. So, until then, fish on and keep on tying!
